Principal's Report



Dear Parents & Carers,

As we approach the halfway point of the term, it is like a beehive here at UC High School with so many staff and students incredibly busy engaging in all manner of activities and events. During Wk. 4 (20th – 23rd May) we saw parent teacher interviews conducted online. As I walked the corridors checking in with staff it was wonderful to see so many parents and carers engaged in meaningful conversations with our teachers, all focussed on improving student learning. To further support your child's learning, our semester 1 Assessment Calendars can be found on our school website here. These calendars are designed to complement the Unit Outlines and Google Guardian Summaries. They provide a one-page summary of all assessment items in terms 1 and 2, for all students. Feedback from families suggests they are best used when placed somewhere visible in your home, where they can inform a regular conversation between parents/carers and your children. I encourage you to sit down with your child and take a look.



As I have communicated in the past, one of our school priorities in 2024 is to strengthen student wellbeing through connection to learning and increased engagement in all areas of school life. Semester 1 2024 has seen a significant growth in activities involving our house system here at UCHSK. The PBL program and a wide variety of different extracurricular areas of school life have been aligned to our house points system. Each and every positive student behaviour that is recognised by a staff member earns points towards their house. We have a huge range of clubs available for students to engage with everything from Agriculture Club, Rainbow Connection, Chess Club, Stop Motion Animation through to a number of different sporting clubs. Attendance at these clubs is also recognised with house points along with participation in events such as Science, Geography and the Maths competitions that are run throughout the year. With the house competition such a tightly run race at the moment, your child's participation could make all the difference in the overall outcome.



Tuesday 21st May saw 70 enthusiastic UCHSK students participate in the 2024 Computational and Algorithmic Thinking Competition (CAT). It was the first of two events offered by the Mathematics Faculty which the school board generously covered the cost of participation - thank you! The CAT competition is an is a one-hour problem-solving competition designed to encourage student curiosity and promote multiple modes of thinking that helps identify students' computer programming potential. We are proud of all participants and are looking forward to celebrating their results. A huge thank you to the Maths staff, in particular Jen Comans for her work in organising the event.

On the 17th May we celebrated IDAHOBIT Day which is the international day against Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia. It was great to see our students and staff enjoying the range of cakes and other baked goods that were on sale but more importantly spending time together appreciating the supportive and tolerant environment. Thanks to staff members Bek Kordas and Amber Quigley for their involvement.



We have a large volume of lost property, particularly UCHSK jumpers!


We have sorted through the items and anything that was labelled, we have attempted to return.

Addressing Your Child's **Anxious Avoidance**

WHAT IS THE ADDRESSING YOUR CHILD'S ANXIOUS

AVOIDANCE PARENT WORKSHOP?
Addressing Your Child's Anxious Avoidance is a 2-hour workshop facilitated by the School Psychology Service aimed at helping parents/carers increase their child's ability to cope with anxiety and decrease anxious avoidance. During the workshop parents/carers have the opportunity to develop a clear plan to address their child's anxious behaviours.

WHAT DOES THE WORKSHOP INVOLVE?

Each workshop will have approximately 12 participating families (one or both parents/carers) and is facilitated by two school psychologists. Activities are based on the Non-Violent Resistance evidence-based therapeutic approach. Your child does not attend the workshop with you.

ARE THERE ANY RISKS FOR PARTICIPANTS?

It's possible that when participants start to use the strategies taught in the program, they or their child may initially experience a higher level of distress as anxious behaviours are addressed. However, as participants continue learning and practicing a wider range of strategies, these are likely to reduce.

HOW WILL INFORMATION BE KEPT AND SHARED? Information shared within the group is confidential and is not shared outside of the workshop. Should facilitators become concerned about a child's safety or well-being external agencies will be notified. Where appropriate, the facilitators will endeavour to assist families to identify the appropriate next steps in gaining support.

At the end of the workshop participants will be asked to complete short questionnaire. This data is used to evaluate the effectiveness of the program. File notes regarding parent/carer involvement in the program will be recorded, stored securely, and placed on an electronic student School Psychology file.





The Enrichment Grants provide funding of up to \$2,000 to help eligible applicants to achieve their goals. It also provides an opportunity for them to make decisions, take responsibility, or initiate projects in collaboration with an experienced mentor of their choice. The grant funding can contribute to costs like equipment, forums, courses, or travel expenses.
